News From Pine Valley Community Village

It is with mixed emotion that I write this, my last column from Pine Valley. I am retiring from a vocation that I truly love-caring for the elderly. It is something that I have devoted 37 years of my life to. I am thankful and happy as I reflect on my years at Pine Valley. Thankful that the County Board made the commitment to continue to care for the elderly of Richland County as there is a growing need, and thankful for our supportive community that has donated selflessly of their time, treasures and talents to make Pine Valley what it is today.

The healthcare and long term care industry is changing. Richland County has a greater number of people aged 65 and older than most other Wisconsin counties and this population is growing. Almost half of County residents over 65 depend on social security as their only source of income. This leaves little to spend on housing and services.

Some folks may think that they will never need a nursing home. However, studies show that many people aged 65-74 spend time in a nursing home to recuperate from surgery or illness. Nationally, almost 60% of those aged 57-61 will spend some time in a nursing home during their lifetime.

The Pine Valley Trustee Board considered building a new nursing home for many years. Faced with an aging structure and outdated operating systems that needed complete replacement, three options were evident-build a new structure, close the nursing home, or do nothing. The do nothing option would ultimately lead to closure as the cost to continue the structural operation would skyrocket. In 2011 Wipfli analyzed the future need for long term care services in the county and if a new building was feasible. The study showed a continued and growing need for nursing home beds with assisted living into the future. It indicated that the new building would generate additional revenue that could be applied towards the debt service.

The building subcommittee made every decision with consideration to develop efficiencies and provide value to the taxpayers, including features such as: automatic light shutoffs, geothermal, HVAC controls to optimize rooms in use and a layout placing supplies close to point of service.

The building project poured \$867,445.54 locally into the economy with businesses such as: Sears, American Do It Center, **Bob Ewers Excavating, Lakes** Gas, Strang Heating, Niesen Landscaping, Town and County TV, Joan Carley Upholstery, **Greeley Signs, Dennis Brown** Landscaping, Frame Corner, Harlan's Furniture, Nelson's Tru Value, Walmart, Genuine Telecom, Center Stove and Fireplace, Augelli Concrete, **Bandbox Cleaners, Bindl Bauer,** Culligan, Gander Cleaning, **Kraemer Water Store, Nature's** Way, Lycon, Pine River Leasing, Premier Coop, Richland **Observer, Schmitt Technical** Service, Town and Country Sanitation, Weiser Concrete, and Johnson Inspections. Contractors such as Vogel Brothers, Gerke, H & H, NAMI, JF Ahern Plumbing and Rural Masonry employed local artisans, trades and labor for an additional \$7,990.409.00.

Pine Valley made its first loan payment for the new building and was prepared to make a second loan payment but the Richland County Finance Committee decided that Pine Valley's cash was needed to fund other county departments for a bulk of the year in 2018. Pine Valley has already set aside the majority of the third loan payment which will be made October 2018, and plans to make its loan payments in the future.

Every county department receives an appropriation from the county general fund for their operations. Some departments generate revenue and others do not. The amount allotted to Pine Valley from the general fund has by Kathy Cianci Administrator

decreased steadily over the years. In 2018 the amount has been reduced to a little more than \$120k that Pine Valley will receive from the general fund (of an \$8M budget). Apart from this amount from the general fund, Pine Valley is self-supporting. It pays for any equipment, repairs, supplies, wages and wage increases that are approved. A recent study found that **Pine Valley operations have a financial impact to the local economy of \$18,759,341.00, and creates 200 jobs.**

Pine Valley is rated 5 stars by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid, (a distinction only 10% of nursing homes share). It is listed among the top nursing homes in U.S. News and World Reports. I work with many caring and competent staff who dedicate their lives to making the lives of others better in some way. We are interested in providing the facts and true information about Pine Valley. I know there is an increasing need for nursing home beds, and that odds are I will need long term care at some point in the future. I consider myself fortunate to have worked with the caring and skilled staff of Pine Valley Community Village and am thankful that when I need it, this excellent facility and staff are here.

It is COLD AND FLU Season!

There is no cure for colds and flu. As they say, prevention is the best medicine! Prevention of the flu is best accomplished by getting your flu shot. It is an important measure in long-term care facilities like Pine Valley, where so many people are living and working. Approximately 93% of our staff have been vaccinated against the flu, a real testament to the concern that our staff have for our vulnerable residents. While you will hear that this year's vaccination is not a great match for the circulating strains, it is thought that those that are vaccinated and do become ill may become less ill and thus less likely to be hospitalized.

In an article written in WebMD there were eight additional measures you can take to lessen your chance of getting sick this cold and flu season! They are as follows:

#1 Wash Your Hands

Most cold and flu viruses are spread by touching germs that have been left on surfaces like telephones, keyboards, or doorknobs. Someone sneezes into their hand and touch the object. Because germs can live of surfaces for hours, someone else comes along and touches the object and end up sick.

#2 Cover your Cough – and NOT with your Hands!

Germs cling to your bare hands and then are spread to surfaces you touch. Sneeze into a tissue, then throw it away immediately. If you don't have a tissue, cough or sneeze into the inside of your elbow or sleeve.

#3 Avoid touching your Face

Cold and flu viruses enter your body through the eyes, nose, or mouth. Touching their faces is the major way children catch colds and a key way they pass colds on to their family.

#4 Exercise!

Aerobic exercise gets your heart working, gets more oxygen into your blood and makes you sweat. These things strengthen our immune system, helping us to fight off the cold and flu viruses.

#5 Eat more Fruits and Vegetables

The old say, an apple a day keeps the doctor away was pretty great advice! Natural chemicals called "phytochemicals" contained in plants give the vitamins in food a boost. Better than taking a vitamin pill, eat more dark green, yellow and red fruits and vegetables.

#6 Don't Smoke

Statistics show that heavy smokers get more severe colds and more frequent ones. Smoke attacks your immune system, dries out your nasal passages, and paralyze "cilia" that line your mucous membranes and sweep cold and flu viruses our of our nasal passages. Smoke from one cigarette can paralyze these tiny hairs for 30-40 minutes.

#7 Cut Alcohol Consumption

Heavy alcohol consumption suppresses the immune system making you more prone to infections. Alcohol also dehydrates the body.

#8 Relax

Relaxation boosts your immune system. When relaxation skills are put into action, your interleukins -- leaders in the immune system response against cold and flu viruses -- increase in the bloodstream. Try to do something relaxing for at least 30 minutes every day. Read, take a walk, or just breath!

Lastly, please remember the importance of staying home when you are ill! While we are always happy to have visitors at Pine Valley, please delay your visit until you are well. If you see a sign on the door that alerts you to illness in our facility, please consider visiting at another time as well. Stay healthy!
